The MAIADS conference offers a holistic perspective on chemical dependency by providing a focus on children, youth, adults, elders, and community healing. State licensure in chemical dependency requires a focus on cultural knowledge and skill development. In keeping with this requirement, many of the Institute's presenters are credentialed professionals who are American Indian.

The Institute is the coming together of chemical dependency professionals who serve Anishinaabeg and Dakota people, and personnel from the Minnesota Department of Human Services. The Anishinaabeg and the Dakota represent the eleven federally recognized tribes in Minnesota, as well as many urban non-profit programs serving American Indian families in Minnesota.

Keynote Speakers

Monday, July 25, 2016



Community Leadership Perspective (Panel) In this keynote panel we will hear what the panel participants have learned from their personal and professional life in working with substance abuse, what things worked when they were in office, what is working now, what they believe doesn't work and what they think needs to be done to impact the drug and alcohol epidemic.

Tuesday, July 26, 2016



LeMoine LaPointe, is a member of the Sicangu Lakota, the Titunwan division of the Oceti Sakowin (Seven Council Fires). The living legacy of his indigenous people enlivens his more than 35 years of engagement – centered facilitation and leadership of youth at risk and adults in culturally-exclusive and multi-cultural settings, from geographically isolated tribal communities to ethnically diverse inner-city neighborhoods.

His infusion of indigenous culture and contemporary adventure-based practice in his consultant work restores the extraordinary in a field too often saturated with ordinary experiences. His integration of environmental, nature based, and wilderness centered experience offers a fresh approach to organizational and community engagement. He chairs the boards of the American Indian OIC and AIM Interpretive Center. He is a founding board member of the Tiwahe Foundation and Native Youth Alliance of Minnesota. LaMoine also is a member of the Indian Health Board of Minneapolis.

Wednesday, July 27, 2016



J. Carlos Rivera is the Executive Director at White Bison, Inc. Carlos is an enrolled tribal member with the Sherwood Valley Band of Pomo Indians and is also of Mexican descent. He is originally from Northern Ca. but currently resides in Sioux Falls, SD with his family. Carlos, CADC-II, received his degree in Chemical Dependency Studies at the American River College. He served as a substance abuse treatment provider for 10-years at the Sacramento Native American Health Center, Inc. providing services to adult men and women on parole, juvenile offenders and other referrals from the Department of Corrections. He continues to make a difference in Native Tribal communities serving as the Executive Director for White Bison, Inc. In his role he oversees daily operations and is also passionate about developing new curriculum to better meet the needs of Native American/Alaska Native communities. Carlos has also been an active committee member for the Juvenile Justice & Delinquency State Committee for California, appointed by Governor

Jerry Brown. Carlos has faced many adversities in his life that have ultimately guided him to build resiliency, discipline and a sense of direction in his life. Carlos grew up without a father or mother figure and became a ward of the court at age 13, resulting in him spending most of his adolescent years in treatment programs, group homes and Youth Authorities. Through the process of treatment and recovery Carlos found a greater purpose in life which inspired and motivated him to establish a healthy foundation for his family.

Friday, July 29, 2016



Tom Barrett, ADC II, CPS II, is the Executive Director for Red Lake Chemical Health Program. He is a certified level three counselor and certified prevention specialist. Tom has worked 25 years in the chemical health field. He is currently the chairman of the American Indian Advisory Council and Vice Chairman for UMICAD Certification Board and serves on many other boards in his community. Tom is the founder

of the Annual Four day Sobriety Run running with a team of runners from Red Lake to Mash-kwawisen in Sawyer Minnesota and 2016 marks the 20th year of the Sobriety run. Tom works diligently to advocate and implemented strong cultural methods and tools to utilize in treatment and prevention programs in Red Lake and oversees eight programs under Red Lake Chemical Health. He is a certified trainer and speaks at many conferences and events. Tom likes to go ricing and hunting, garden, and harvests traditional foods every fall. Tom is a dedicated family man who loves to spend time with his family.

Karen Barrett, ADC III, CPS II, is a Prevention Supervisor at Red Lake Chemical Health. She's been employed for 24 years. She has worked in inpatient and outpatient treatment settings and, for the last eight years, in prevention. She has extensive experience in planning and implementing huge community events and cultural camps. She is the founder of the Vision Makers and the Our Red Lake Spirit Project, which allowed her to create a media arts studio in Red Lake. The media arts studio helps youth participate in digital storytelling and photography, while advocating Positive Community Norms and hope for their Nation. In 2015, after much hard work, Karen and her prevention team was awarded the Commissioner's Circle of Excellence.


