11. Catalog/Course description:

Media Photography focuses on both the editorial content and the technical skills needed to produce quality photographic images used in artistic websites, news bulletins, documentaries, public service announcements, advertisements, and other forms of viewing images. Basic concepts of photography such as the use of light and shadows, composition and visual literacy will be explored. Image editing software will be used to edit and enhance pictures. Students will learn about the legal, moral, and ethical aspects involved in the artistic and imaginative approach to four interconnected styles of photography – journalism, public relations, marketing, and art. The goal is to expand the student's media literacy while they gain practical skills in effective communication using the medium of photography.
